Non-resident use of amenities

Summer tends to be a time when we face more challenges related to non-resident use of our amenities. Only residents and their accompanied guests may use these resources. We need your help! Please review the points below and do what you can to protect the quality of our community.

- Beach and watercraft: wear your neon green wristband to the beach, store and lock your watercraft, dogs are not allowed at the beach
- Fishing: absolutely no fishing at the beach or in the water near the beach
- Village Green Flagstones: many of these are loose or missing, and some of it appears intentional. We are requesting proposals for repairs, which we expect to be very expensive.

How you can help: if you see something, say something. Ideally, you can step in to stop non-resident use of amenities or inappropriate behavior, including vandalism, by anyone. We do not have security guards or cameras (except at the fitness center). The increased wear and tear, not to mention intentional damage, will divert our assessment funds to unplanned repairs instead of improvements and expansions. Community Center Committee Update—July 2025

Where we are now

The Community Center Committee remains hard at work and is currently in the Listening and Discovery phase. At this time, no financial estimate is available, as we are still identifying the community's wants and needs. Per Section 5.02 of our By-Laws, any new amenity over \$25,000 must receive approval from two-thirds of the community.

We've shared preliminary building requirements—based on your survey responses—with Rick Phillips, a founding architect of Prairie Crossing. The committee is currently focused on:

- Engaging with the community
- Exploring possible building layouts
- Assessing potential financial implications and funding options

Counterpoint: Do NOT hang your laundry to dry in the sun!

It's August! Time to Wash the Snowpants!

These long, hot summer days are perfect for enjoying the beach, admiring colorful prairie blooms, harvesting summer produce, and washing your snowpants. (And mittens, knit hats, scarves, coats, wool socks, and thick gloves).

Summer is the best time to wash your winter gear and hang it outside to dry. What normally requires at least an hour of heat and tumbling in your dryer is accom-

I am writing in response to Mary Pebble's MeadowMix article (August 2024) in which she encouraged people to hang their clothes to dry outside. I've not seen an increase in households hanging their laundry to dry in the sun, and I am here to explain why. There are many good reasons NOT to air dry your laundry.

First, I do not have time to carry the laundry basket the short distance between my laundry room and a clothesline on my porch. I am very busy! I

must go to the gym where I pay a personal trainer an exorbitant price to help me lift weights and stretch my arms.

Besides, I do not have the necessary equipment. So much equipment! A rope, and clothespins, and a few more clothespins! How and where would I ever acquire these? And where would I store them? I simply have no space in my laundry room, where I keep a very large metal dryer which cost several hundred dollars and which adds to my utility bill each time I run it. (This is often, since I do not hang my clothes to dry in the sun, which is free.)

Mary claims everyone in PC can hang laundry outside. She says a clothesline can be strung up between two trees (where would I find those?), or easily installed with a small, unobtrusive hook attached to a porch post. Install a piece of hardware? What? Where would I find someone, anyone, who could handle such a complicated and laborious task? I am a college-educated homeowner, but I am also certain this is beyond my ability.

Mary suggests laundry drying on a line looks wholesome or otherwise attractive. Foolishness! The porches in PC are deep and accommodating, but not for the sake of families who live here. Our porches are designed for fashionable outdoor furniture from catalogs. People shouldn't actually use their porches! Because that would ruin the aesthetic!

Mary also claims hanging laundry outside is an easy way to enjoy the outdoors. Nonsense. Sure, you might accidentally hear birdsong or enjoy flowers when you pop out to see if your towels are dry. But this doesn't count. To enjoy nature, you must block out an entire afternoon to walk the trails, row a kayak, or mow your lawn with kitchen shears.

About the lake...August 2025

The Lake Management Committee

Hey and Associates completed the data analysis and submitted a report on the bathymetric (depth) and sediment mapping that was recently done for Lake Leopold. Some areas of minor soft sediment accumulation were noted ("muck" from decaying plants), but no indication that there is a major issue with sediment removal that needs to be addressed. There may be more appropriate and cost-effective methods to lake management than dredging, particularly with respect to our time scale.

The lake is at the top of the watershed with no source of inflow to bring in sediment, there is heavy filtration from the surrounding prairie, and most of the shoreline is stabilized with plant growth. We may be better served by focusing on the internal loading of nutrients, which is probably the key driver of our lake's aquatic life cycle. Our sediment is primarily organic matter; nutrient deactivation, mechanical removal, and selective treatment of plant growth may provide a more optimum cost/benefit.

This will significantly reduce the cost impact on our reserves and reduce the requirement that we draw down the large amount of money that has been set aside for sediment removal in the reserve account. Some smaller projects such as targeted aeration/oxygenation or nutrient management may be useful in future years, but the need does not exist for a major dredging project.

Lake water clarity has been quite good up until the end of June. Secchi disk readings (how far down you can see through water) were 7–8 feet but have degraded to 3–4 feet at the beginning of July. Warm weather, sunshine, and sufficient nutrients have caused the lake to "bloom" a bit. Much of that is positive; ILM confirmed with an aquatic plant survey in June that we have good plant cover for fish and other creatures. Some invasive plant growth was noted, and that will be on our list for some targeted pre-emergent treatment in the spring.

Adina and Andy Ott continue with monthly water quality measurements using the multiparameter unit and photometer equipment, and have measured a significant increase in chlorophyll, in addition to shifting dissolved oxygen profiles and temperature

stratification. So, nature is taking its course and algae is starting to bloom; enough of the right kind is good—it's food for the creatures in the lake and generates oxygen. However, as conditions progress, we will be on the lookout for harmful algae blooms (actually cyanobacteria), both visually and through testing.

As an early screen, we will be using the BlueGreen Test by 5Strands to rapidly detect the presence of potential cyanotoxins; probably each Friday, to get results before the weekend. This is a new product introduced to us by some of our colleagues in the local lake coordination group. This same-day test reduces the need to send samples out to a lab and wait for almost a week to get results.

Similarly, the Lake County Health Department tests Lake Leopold water conditions at the beach for bacteria contamination every other Monday. Their testing on July 7 was the day after the heavy rains, the results exceeded the EPA limit, and LCHD called and advised the HOA to close the beach until their subsequent testing was within limits. Their advisory was based on a measurement of 461 cfu/100 mL and the limit is 235. We had been running about 10–20 so far this season. Actual data and beach condition status can be found on the Illinois Department of Public Health Beach Guard website (listed as Leopold Lake, tab 4, in the Private Beaches section.)

Following a similar practice by our colleagues at other lakes, we will try and take water samples after heavy rainfall and send them to the LCHD laboratory for testing, and not wait for the bimonthly visit. This will take about a day, so homeowners should still use caution before enjoying the beach and entering the water. IDPH advises: "The water quality at many Illinois beaches can be influenced by heavy rainfall. If a recent heavy rainfall makes the water look cloudy, the beach may not be safe even if the most recent sample results were satisfactory. Use common sense and good judgment anytime you swim in natural waters. If the water does not look inviting, don't swim." After heavy rain, waiting a day or two before swimming may be considered good practice.

The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly

"A thing is right when it tends to preserve the integrity of the biotic community. It is wrong when it tends otherwise."
~Aldo Leopold

How to treat the bad and the ugly, while making room for the good.

We all have some of these bad guys in our home prairies or prairies near our home. But you can reduce them by following the practices mentioned below. Some need chemical treatment, but many can be removed mechanically by hand. This will make room for more desirable plants. Especially if you add native seed late in the fall.

Nodding or Musk thistle: This is a biennial. Remove the nodding, red/purple flowers, cut the stem below the soil, or wear heavy gloves and pull the whole plant out and discard. If you recognize the first-year rosette, pull it out like a dandelion or treat with 1% Transline or Stinger.

Curly dock: Cut the seed head and/or pull the plant out by the roots and remove from the site. It likes to grow in wet swales.

Giant ragweed, and lesser ragweed: Pull and remove. These plants are annuals that like to fill bare ground and can shade or crowd out desirable plants. They also tell us to add native seed in these spots.

Canada thistle: This is a perennial. Cut and remove multiple times, or use an easier, more permanent approach—spray with Transline 1% or Stinger. This species usually needs these specific herbicides to be controlled because it forms a clone.

Queen Anne's lace: This is a biennial. Pull it once or cut it a thousand times, take your pick. It shows us a place to sow native seeds in the fall.

Yellow Sweet clover: Pull it when in full flower and remove. Best done after a good soaking rain. Or tease it out of the ground with a soil knife.

White sweet clover: Can be pulled out at any time, or you can cut it at soil level when the bottom twelve inches of the stem are spotted with brown splotches and are branchless. If you cut this plant before the stems turn brownish on the bottom you may have to cut again and again and still you may get viable seed to develop.

Bull thistle: This is a biennial. Remove the flower heads, cut stem below soil level, or pull out with sturdy gloves. Treat rosettes like dandelions or dig out with soil knife.

Reed canary grass: Cut the seed heads and discard in the garbage. Tie it in a bunch and treat it with 5% glyphosate that is approved for use in wet areas. Use the hand of death method—a cotton glove worn over a rubber glove. Spray the product into the cotton glove and wipe the plant.

Purple loosestrife: Don't wait until it becomes a monoculture and pray that the Galerucella beetles prevent them from flowering! Instead, take action by cutting and removing the flower heads, treat leaves and stems with glyphosate approved for use in wet areas; or treat with the hand of death method and 5% solution of glyphosate.

Teasel: Spray the rosettes with Weed B Gon or Transline 1% before they bolt and flower. Too late? Then cut all the flower heads and remove from site then cut the stem at an angle below ground level.

Bird's-foot trefoil: (yellow flowers), and **Crown vetch** (pinkish flowers): Spray in spring or fall with Transline or Stinger or Weed B Gon. These are tough ones to get rid of so do not delay. A small population may be dug out by hand, but early treatment seems best. This species is being spread by mowers shattering and spreading the seed. We are seeing more of it spread in PC and in the lawns as well as along the roads near us. At least remove the mature seed and discard. They look like three fingers that are brownish in color with bumps showing the seed.

Tall goldenrod: This is a native that gets aggressive. It is also allelopathic, which makes it difficult for other species to germinate and grow in the area. Pull it after a good rain. There are many good native goldenrods so make sure you are pulling the tall or Canadian goldenrod. When you pull it, you will notice it forms a shallow root that leads to other plants. The root shows a little reddish/purple color on the root. The leaves are only saw-toothed halfway down the leaf.

It usually has a brownish color when ready for collection and planting. Rake it into the ground and step on the loosened soil to give good seed to soil contact.




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Annual Prairie Crossing Family Beach Campout
