March of the Blood Moon

It floated out from the dark drink of middle night and hovered like an immense ripe plum. Something a god might pluck with huge fingers from the constellated tree of Monoceros. A blood jewel dangling below Cassiopeia's massive throat, Andromeda's queenly mother, hung upside down for flaunting their beauty, a shining rope of barbed stars coiled around lovely ankles and lashed to the legs of her captive chair.

I am speaking of a blood moon. The hunter's moon. The worm moon.

It has risen and vanished, a notable phenomenon splashed across an infinitude of reflective screens and now sealed away in vast honeycombs of the What Was, dripping sticky nectar for a short while onto human consciousness. Then it is chronicled and catalogued, to be noted at the advent of the next lunar eclipse. Then it is forgotten.

But I want to conjure the red moon from memory. For I was there.

March. Our weather prophets reveal a full moon will roll like a wheel carved from bone across the night sky until earth's shadow covers its face like a painted Egyptian shroud. It blossoms crimson and wet above prairie grass when darkness shares its secrets with silence. I decide I must witness this wonder of the heavens.

A dream alarm wakes me at 2 a.m. When I emerge behind my house and look up I see stars burn like the ghosts of druidic priests. Above the gable, above the willow tree, the silo and the steeple, a Faustian moon has begun its slow exhale of light. I think of yellow desert, clawing vapor, a wrathful pharaoh. The air feels old and dry, like layers of parchment I might peel to glimpse the secret alphabet of gods and monsters.

Tonight I am the solitary worshipper in a becalmed suburbia. Not one neighbor steps away from all the certainties of measured time to raise their clasping hands in supplication below the luminous hallucination, disrobing for a hunger older than invented gods. I check to see if the lonely insomniac is standing in his backyard, hands in pockets, head tilted to the sky. But he is nowhere to be found. Perhaps they will scroll through newsfeeds tomorrow morning over coffee, gazing at the splendid pictures. But that is a parlor trick of invisible ink. The breath of time exhales in its moment of being.

When I look again the moon has reddened more deeply, polished like Verona marble, lustrous as a pomegranate seed. The ancient poet Sappho imagined it as a symbol for Persephone, separated by the eclipsing darkness from her mother, Demeter, the embodiment of Earth. In Mesopotamia the Sumerians worshipped Nanna, moon father, and his wife and daughter, Ningal and Inanna, the goddess of love. So it was across cultures and millennia. So it is for the disciple standing in Autumn leaves, gazing through binoculars at a harvest moon rising like the Great Pumpkin.

I wonder if all such worship carries its own cost of estrangement, like Thales of Miletus who, gazing at the stars, fell into a well. A servant girl rescued him but scolded the philosopher for expecting to comprehend the mysteries of the sky when he can't even see what's under his feet.

PCHOA Truck Borrowing Process

Effective April 8, 2024

- **Each** licensed driver in your home who wants to be able to use the truck must submit a hold harmless agreement **in advance** to the management company to be kept on file. The agreement was included as an insert in the April Meadow Mix, and is available on pchoa.com and the Foster Premier portal.
- Foster Premier will keep a list of approved borrowers that is accessible to the board.
- **Please note**, the truck key has an Apple AirTag which will only be used if the keys are lost.
- **When you want to use the truck**, please contact a board member in advance at board@pchoa.com or by text to arrange to pick up the key. Priority for using the truck will continue to be given to the Environmental Stewardship Committee and for PCHOA events.

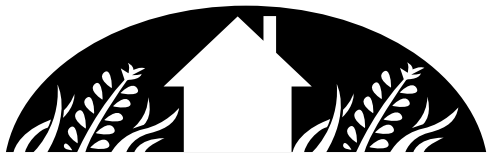

- **Record mileage in the User Log** binder on the seat of the truck
- **When you have finished using the truck:**
 - ♦ Return it to the previous parking spot
 - ♦ Lock both doors
 - ♦ Return the key to the lockbox
 - ♦ Text the board member who gave you access to let them know you have returned the key

*** Please note the following rules for using the truck ***

- All drivers and passengers must have a hold harmless agreement on file with the management company
- Use is limited to 3 hours unless pre-approved by the Board
- Personal use only, the truck cannot be used for any sort of business
- Keep the distance of use limited to a 30 mile radius from Prairie Crossing
- Refill the gas used
- Clean up the truck after use
- If you go on the toll road, you are responsible for all charges
- If you get a ticket while using the truck, you are responsible
- If anything happens when using the truck, report this to the Board and the management company immediately (accident, damage, warning light) and provide photos
- If you notice damage prior to using the truck, report this immediately

Are We Truly Independent?

"If all mankind were to disappear, the world would regenerate back to the rich state of equilibrium that existed ten thousand years ago. If insects were to vanish, the environment would quickly collapse into chaos." ~E. O. Wilson

We cannot live and thrive without "the little things that run the world"—insects. Yet we are waging an insane war against them. They offer us services through their ecological roles and yet we spray, zap, and fog the few we consider pests. But when we do that, we are killing all the beneficial ones we depend on to provide those same essential services in the process. Insects pollinate 82% of all plants. If all insects were destroyed, we would survive only for a matter of months on this earth. Plants turn the sun's energy into food for all life on earth. Insects are the primary means by which food created by plants is delivered to animals. This is how the complex food web of life works. Insects sustain the system. The natural system provides its own "pest" control. Birds eat the insects, especially when feeding their young the protein and fat the nestlings need for rapid growth. Many of us feed seeds and suet to the birds but think nothing of spraying, fogging, and zapping insects, which deprives birds of the protein and fat they need for the successful raising of the next generation.

What else do insects do for us?

Insects sustain the ecosystem by providing pest control, decomposing dead plant and animal matter, maintaining a well-vegetated planet, maintaining a clean watershed, pollinating much of the food we eat, and sequestering carbon that would otherwise be in the atmosphere. So, we are not independent from these creatures which, in ignorance, our culture often despises. No one is advocating bringing them into our homes, but certainly they provide needed services in our yards, neighborhoods, prairies, savannas, forests, wetlands, farms, orchards, etc.

The ant species that build mounds in our prairies provide many beneficial services: they turn the soil and take seed coatings to their nest, remove the germination inhibitors, and then plant them. They are not at all interested in our kitchens (different species). The mosquitoes in our yard provide protein for the birds. They are truly only active at certain times of the day, and in a balanced system do not become a problem. In fact, there have been studies showing that more mosquitoes are found in a blue grass lawn than in a field of native plants.

The Chinese in the sixties had a program to kill the birds that were eating their stored grain. The program led to an ecological mess. Soon all the grasses holding soil vanished because birds were no longer eating grass root grubs. Winds removed topsoil, creating dust storms; and respiratory problems multiplied with the dust storms. Crops were not being pollinated. In fact, some pears grown in China still must be hand pollinated. The program had to be abandoned because it interfered with the natural system we all depend on.

We need all the creatures in the web of life. We will soon celebrate our Independence Day, as we should. We should also acknowledge and celebrate our dependency on the services the insects provide for the complex web of life the planet depends on and stop our insane self-destructive war on them. What we need is a cultural transformation: rather than acting as if we are independent of nature; we need to behave more reverently and respectfully toward nature.

What can one individual do?

Awareness of this dependency is the first step to a solution. Take out some of your bluegrass lawn and plant native forbs, shrubs, and trees. Insects and birds evolved with native plants and get little or no benefit from European and Asian plants we have come to landscape our homes with. The Monarch butterfly decline is trying to tell us something. Monarchs need more than just milkweed to survive. They need a variety of native flowering plants to thrive, especially the asters and goldenrods that fuel their fall migration. When I used to take long bike rides in rural areas, native plants and milkweed that sustained Monarchs during migration still grew along the roads. Now, with Roundup ready corn and soybeans and "get big or get out of the way farming" the rural roads are depleted of most native species. This one cultural change has added to the decline of the Monarch and many other species we depend on. We can reverse this by treating our properties as places that sustain life; planting native species and putting up with the insects that we consider to be pests. That small cultural change will help feed the system that has given
